# KEN FUENTES

# WILLOW LEAF FICUS AND MORE

en Fuentes has been a long time bonsai artist, and is one of the founders of the Conejo Valley Bonsai Society. Originally from Florida, it's no wonder that Ken's specialty and passion is the Ficus.

"Ficus are very forgiving trees; they'll take any water, they'll take any fertilizer, and they'll take almost any soil that doesn't stay wet. Being a tropical, they compress a bunch of growing seasons... unlike the once a year seasons of conifers and pines, Ficus' growth will all depend on how much fertilizer, direct sunlight, and humidity it receives, and it will keep growing.

"I repot Ficus every year, whether it needs it or not. I'm currently using EB Stone Cactus mix consistently in each pot. It holds water, yet dries pretty quickly. If you use different soils in your various trees, they will dry at different rates making it hard to recognize over/under watering, so I like to keep my soil mix consistent. You can usually tell when a Ficus is getting too much water, as it will never get a full flush of growth.

"I try to cut out any root that is too thick. Since all of my pots are shallow, I only keep the outer surface roots. Any roots that grow down, or right below the surface, get cut. When I'm developing the tree, I don't plant them high in the container. I'll put about ½" of soil at the bottom of the pot, place the tree and fan out the roots, then add soil over the top to bury them. The reason is that when surface roots get full sun, they tend not to develop quickly, so for maximum surface root development, I temporarily bury them and then gradually bring them to the surface over time.

"Sacrifical branches are important to grow thick trunks. I used to let them grow large which left a huge round scar that diminished the beauty of the trunk. Now, what I'll do is cut them off earlier, but not before I've already allowed a new sacrificial branch to start developing."



ften, the sacrificial branch will become stronger than the main tree itself. I watch for this constantly, and when it happens, I'll defoliate the sacrificial branch. If that doesn't balance the growth out, then I'll start removing parts of the branch, an inch off each branch at a time. After a week, if it's still unbalanced, I'll do another inch. I do this until the energy growth moves back to the tree.

"Choosing the right sacrificial branch placement is important. If I have a tree that needs root development in a certain spot, I'll try to create the sacrificial branch on that same side, so as to develop corresponding roots there as well. It's all energy flow - you're just picking and choosing where to direct the energy."

Ken then spent some time at the end of the demo to speak to members who brought in trees. Great advice and direction was given.

In all, Ken spent the entire two hours regaling us with great information and terrific anecdotes. Definitely more information than can be captured in a newsletter article.

Editor's note: For the full story, you really should attend our meetings, and experience the demonstrations yourself. You can get questions answered, as well as network and hobnob amongst other enthusiasts, just as passionate about bonsai as you are.

You will not regret it.





































































# KENJA MYATA

BONSAI MASTER



he first day of the show enjoyed near perfect Central California weather. The energy of the crowd was high, and so was the anticipation of the show's first demonstration by Kenji Miyata.


Kenji is a revered and respected mentor, teacher, and artist in the bonsai community, and has been for many years. Trained in Japan by Masamitsu Kubota, Toshinori Suzuki, and Yasuo Mitsuya, Mr. Miyata has become affectionately known as the sensei's sensei, and his loyal students often travel from great distances to train under him.

Mr. Miyata is one of the very few true Nippon Bonsai Association certified Bonsai Masters now living in the U.S. The Nippon Bonsai Association was founded in Japan, by bonsai hobbyists and professional bonsai artists with the purpose of promoting and disseminating the art of bonsai.

On February 2nd, Kenji began working diligently with the Clark Bonsai Collection curatorial team, led by Curator, Bob Hilvers, to transplant and restyle several trees in the collection. This was the first of four work sessions with the curatorial team scheduled with Miyata Sensei, over the coming year.

During the demo, Kenji made quick work of restyling this classic *Moyogi* style Juniper. The bones of the tree were already set, so Kenji concentrated on the detail work. Bob Hilvers took charge in narrating Kenji's work, and also entertained the crowd with his wit, wisdom, knowledge, and anecdotes.

The tree was sold to a local bidder at the Saturday benefit auction, so hopefully, this won't be the last time we see this show worthy tree.



he tree Kenji used for his demonstration is a San Jose Juniper, approximately sixty years old. It was originally donated to the Clark Bonsai Collection by Kathy Boomsma in 2003.

It was displayed in the Exhibit of the 2007 GSBF Convention, and was one of the trees critiqued. After the 2007 Convention, the tree was used in several exhibit rotations of the Bonsai Garden at the Clark Center for Japanese Art and Culture.

During the intervening years of transferring the Clark Bonsai Collection to GSBF, and the construction of the new bonsai facility at the Shinzen Gardens to house the Collection, it was allowed to "grow-out" to maintain health and vigor, while the Collection was in stasis.

It was among a group of Clark Bonsai Collection Junipers undergoing restoration with the help of bonsai Master Kenji Miyata, when he asked to be allowed to use it as his demo material for the first Kōen-nai No Bonsai.

Happily, a member of the local bonsai community was the winning bidder during the auction, keeping the tree in Central California.



























The collection began with the commitment and dedication of Bill Clark, founder of the Clark Center for Japanese Art & Culture, and Bob Hilvers, a local bonsai artist. This resulted in the establishment of one of the finest public bonsai collections in North America. With the 2015 closure of the Clark Center in Hanford, the bonsai collection was gifted to the GSBF to establish this exhibit.

The Clark Bonsai Collection includes a Legacy Collection created by many of the early pioneers of bonsai in California. It is unique in that it strives to preserve these bonsai as they were created by the original artists. This provides a unique opportunity for generations of bonsai enthusiasts to understand their cultural and historical contributions to the art of bonsai in California.


