Lindsay Shiba – Mt. Fuji Garden Center - July 19, 2013

Lindsay Shiba began learning bonsai in 1970 from his father, Katsumi Shiba (who had learned from John Naka). Lindsay continued his formal training under Khan Komai, who introduced Lindsay to the love of deciduous trees, accent plantings and displaying bonsai in formal settings. John Naka was one of his mentors and Harry Hirao is one of his teachers.

Lindsay presents many demonstrations and workshops in California and around the United States. He teaches beginning through advanced \ workshop courses in bonsai at his family's nursery -- Mt. Fuji Garden Center (http://www.mtfujigardencenter.com) -- in Upland, California. During the last few years, Lindsay has been assisting Ben Oki with demonstrations and workshops. He is a past President of California Bonsai Society, a show chairman of Baikoen Bonsai Kenkyukai's Winter Silhouettes Show, and a member of Nampukai. Lindsay's Bachelor of Science degree in Ornamental Horticulture and minor in Irrigation from California State Polytechnic University, Pomona, has gone "hand-in-hand" with his interests in bonsai and managing the family nursery.

The summer months will bring hot conditions that can fry your trees in a day. Avoid overhead watering during the hot part of the day, water in the early morning or in the early afternoon. You may need to water more than once each day if the temperature becomes very hot. If you have shohin, take special care for those trees which are in small and shallow pots.

Lindsay is a wealth of knowledge and is always a wonderful workshop instructor. If you have time, please stop by and welcome Lindsay, as always food and drink will be provided. 

Manny Martinez June 21, 2013



Teacher/Student Relationship: It is the student's responsibility to be prepared for class by getting the right material to work with. Manny referred to an article from Golden Statements written by Roberta Walters where she stated that a one gallon pencil to thumb size trunk will not develop into a nice bonsai tree in 3 years. Picking the right tree is the first lesson. Share information with club members about good places to find trees including sales and auctions. If attending a workshop, make sure that you have some experience so you do not slow up the rest of the group.

Starter Tree: A good starter tree is a Feomina in a 7-15 gallon container. The most important part of a tree is the 1st 4-6 inches from the base. Roots should have enough space for them to spread out. Don't buy a tree for its foliage. The top of the tree can always be built especially deciduous trees like elms, maples, pomegranate. Can buy a tree in a 24" box and cut it down in size. Best if it can stay in the box for the first growth season but OK to cut the root ball to 1/3 being careful that the roots have not wrapped around the top. A round pot will help roots spread out.

Soil mix: If good soil mix, you should not have to water that often. Manny suggested the use of diatomaceous earth, regular grade oil absorbent (Napa #8822) as it is 60% lighter than decomposed granite and lighter than pumice. It helps to release water into the soil. He mixes that 50% - 50% with generic soil. Manny uses Smart Naturals Ocean Forest Potting Soil which has bone meal and worm casting in it.

Fertilizers: Variety is OK with plant fertilizers. Manny discussed chemical versus organic fertilizers stating that the FDA and USDA do not define organic and reminded us that oil is organic material. Solid fertilizers take longer to break down. Fertilizers are vitamins to plants. Measure exactly to avoid over-fertilization. Water plants before fertilizing and the wait some time after so the soil is damp.. Cool periods are best for fertilizing. In California, we can fertilize all year long. Use liquid fertilizer if you have a problem with animals eating the pellets off your plants. Can use a fertilizer pump or injector. Dynagrow fertilizer has a flow chart of "how to's". Protech can be used on cuttings.

Water: Watering is different by location. The best way to check if plant needs to be watered is to put your finger into the pot and feel for humid soil. Manny suggested the use of magnets on your outside water pipes as a method to get better water for more efficient use. Benefits include increased root growth, soil holds moisture longer, and water conservation. Refer to www.magnetizer..com for more information. No deionizers should be used.

Finishing Touches: Moss is good as an insulator if managed properly. Sprinkling just a little earth worm casting will get rid of pests. The more consistent the environment, the better your plants will be.
